#### **INSTALLMENT PLAN AVAILABILITY**

BE ADVISED that State law requires residential customers to be offered an installment plan for any sewer arrearages accruing between March 9, 2020 and March 15, 2022. To maintain the installment plan, a residential customer must make timely payments on all current charges. More information is available at <a href="https://www.gibbsborotownhall.com">www.gibbsborotownhall.com</a> Sewer liens that were sold before January 1, 2022 cannot be included in the installment plan.

#### LATE FEES, CHARGES AND PENALTIES

BE ADVISED that P.L. 2021, c. 317 prohibits local governments from charging residential customers interest, fees, or charges for late payment of Sewer charges accruing between March 9, 2020 and March 15, 2022 until after March 15, 2022 at which time interest and penalties may begin to accrue. This prohibition does not apply to sewer liens that were sold before January 1, 2022. Late interest, fees or charges may be enforced against arrearages accruing before March 9, 2020 and after March 15, 2022.

#### **BILL ASSISTANCE AND ARREARAGE FORGIVENESS PROGRAMS**

The application period for the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs' Low Income Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) is now open. This federally funded program will provide financial assistance to low-income households to reduce the balances on their residential water and sewer bills. LIHWAP will provide benefits directly to water and sewer service providers on behalf of residential customers. The assistance can be used, in order of priority, to:

- restore services where services have been terminated and pay reconnection fees and other charges accrued due to a disconnection;
- avoid service disruption for those residential customers who are in danger of disconnection (i.e., received shut off notices or have past due balances) and to help them afford bill payment going forward; and
- support those household customers who are current in their bills but might be in danger of falling behind in the near future.

Priority will also be given to families with elderly or disabled household members and/or with children under the age of five, no matter which category they fall into.

To be eligible for LIHWAP assistance, applicants must be water/sewer bill holders who are responsible for paying their water and sewer bills directly to the water/sewer provider. Also, applicants' total gross household income must be at or below 60% of the state median Income (\$6,439 a month for a family of four). Participants in the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) are automatically eligible for LIHWAP assistance so long as they are water/sewer bill holders.

## olutions to Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

#### A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including

colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.



As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

#### Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.



Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

## Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated.

If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.

Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.

Recycle used motor oil.

Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.



## Keep pollution out of storm drains

Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies.

Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.

## Clean up after your pet

Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.

An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.

Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law. And remember to:

Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes.



## Dispose of yard waste properly

Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.

If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.

Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.
Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.



#### **Don't litter**

Place litter in trash receptacles.

Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.

Participate in community cleanups.

### Don't feed wildlife

Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.

Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.

### Gibbsboro and Waterford to Renew Share Court Administrator/Deputy

Gibbsboro and Waterford reached an agreement on a new three-year agreement between the towns that enables the cost of the two positions to be shared. Gibbsboro violations may be paid online or in Waterford during their normal hours. Court will continue to be held in Gibbsboro with a Judge, Prosecutor and Public Defender appointed by and paid for by Gibbsboro. To date the agreement has worked well and has enabled the elimination of a full time and part time position in Gibbsboro.

### Camden County Town Meeting Series Visits Gibbsboro - April 25

The Camden County Town Hall series will again be hosted by the Borough of Gibbsboro. Congressman Donald Norcross will be joined by representatives of the Camden County Commissioners, 6<sup>th</sup> Legislative District, and Mayor Campbell. Questions can be submitted in advance.

The meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Gibbsboro School. At 7:30 attendees will be able to interact with various departments and agencies that provide area services.

#### **Borough Gets Tough on Dirt Bikes & ATVS**



Throughout New Jersey a growing number of ATV and dirt bike operators have been irresponsibly operating their vehicles on public streets, highways, or rights-of-way in violation of the state's laws. Police have been hamstrung by laws that limit their ability to pursue the perpetrators. New laws give local governments more teeth to catch, confiscate, and potentially destroy ATVs and dirt bikes that violate the law. Our bikeway system is considered a public right-of-way.

Gibbsboro is considering adoption of the following law:

#### **ARTICLE VII All-Terrain Vehicles and Dirt Bikes**

#### §171-59 - Prohibited Operation and Forfeiture.

It shall be unlawful and pose an immediate threat to the public health, safety and welfare of the residents of the Borough of Gibbsboro for any person to operate any all-terrain vehicle or dirt bike upon any public street, highway or right-of-way located within the Borough in violation of N.J.S.A. 39:3C-17. Any all-terrain vehicle or dirt bike operated in a manner that violates this Section shall be deemed contraband subjected to forfeiture m accordance with N.J.S. 2C:64-1 et. seq., and shall be disposed of in accordance with the provisions of N.J.S. 2C:64-6 or, at the discretion of the entity funding the prosecuting agency involved, may be destroyed.

The operation of <u>any vehicle</u> on private property, such as the Tri-Boro quarry, <u>requires</u> the permission of the property owner. Tri-Boro expressly prohibits trespassing. The operation of dirt bikes and ATVs on the Borough's open space and public lands is prohibited by ordinance. No motorized vehicles (except for emergency vehicles) are permitted to be operated on the Blueberry Hill walking/bike paths. Any violators will be charged and prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

#### **Police Blotter**

**March 1:** While on a traffic stop for moving violations, police arrested the driver for an active criminal warrant. The driver was released after being issued multiple traffic citations pending a future court appearance.

**March 2:** While on a proactive patrol in the Gibbsboro section of the Tri-Boro quarry, police arrested two juveniles for illegally operating dirt bikes on private property and on public roadways. The dirt bikes were impounded and the juveniles were charged with trespassing and issued multiple citations for traffic and borough ordinance violations. The juveniles were then released to their parents pending their future court appearance.

**March 3:** While on a proactive patrol in the Gibbsboro section of the Tri-Boro quarry, police made contact with four ATV riders who were detained for illegally operating their ATV's on private property. The riders were charged with trespassing and released pending their future court appearance.

All defendants are innocent until proven guilty in a court of law. The Gibbsboro Police Department welcomes any and all reports of illegal activity. Thank you for your continued support of your local police.
