## Inflation Hits Borough Budget

Inflation is hurting everyone, including the Borough budget. Several items have seen significant increases for the 2023 budget including:

Line Item	<u>Increase</u>
Interest on Notes	\$ 62 K
Busing for HS Students	\$ 35 K
Street Lighting	\$8K
Fire Hydrants	\$7K

Increases for these four line-items alone total more than \$100K.

Many of our employee health insurance premiums are increasing by 14%, less than the state sponsored plan, but still a hefty increase. And the cost of gasoline has impacted utilities and all our departments that use gas powered vehicles and equipment.

We continue to work to grow our tax base and other non-property tax revenue sources to better shield taxpayers from the inevitable economic cycles that hurt us all.

## olutions to Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

#### A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases

nust adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.



As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

#### Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

 Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.

 Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.

 Look into alternatives for pesticides.

 Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.

 If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.



Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

#### Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

 Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints.

 Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated. If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.

Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.

Recycle used motor oil.

Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.



## Clean up after your pet

Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.

An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.

Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law. And remember to:

Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes.



## Don't litter

Place litter in trash receptacles.

Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.

Participate in community cleanups.

## Dispose of yard waste properly

Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.

If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.

Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost. Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.



## Keep pollution out of storm drains

Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies.

## Don't feed wildlife

Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.

Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.

## SUPERFUND UPDATE



#### United States Avenue Burn Site (pictured)

 Remediation work began on the west side of United States Avenue on Tuesday, March 7. Remediation along the historic Lucaston railroad tracks and the shoreline of Bridgewood Lake is expected to take approximately one month. The Gibbsboro multipurpose Green Trail will be closed in this area during remediation activities. The trail is expected to be reopened in mid-April. Trail users are encouraged to use other sections of the Gibbsboro trail system. For safety reasons, pedestrians are <u>strongly discouraged</u> from walking in the road adjacent to the work area.

#### Former Manufacturing Plant (AKA Paintworks) Sampling

- Soil sampling will occur at 6 East Clementon (slab area) and the main former plant area (including the Borough-owned stacks parcel) through late March. Samples will be collected with the use of a drill rig.
- Soil borings are scheduled to be advanced, and samples collected, from within Foster Avenue in mid- March.

#### Route 561 Dump Site Unit Groundwater

• Groundwater samples were collected from existing wells located in Generations Memorial Park and along White Sand Branch in early March. In addition, samples will be collected from other properties within the unit under access agreements with the individual property owners.

All schedules are subject to change due to weather and other field conditions.

#### **Pending Applications**

**SonRaj LLC's** site plan application to redevelop several lots along North Lakeview Drive was continued to the March meeting. The applicant has demolished two existing homes at 101 and 103 Lakeview Drive and will be rehabilitating the former bank building at 95 North Lakeview Drive to be a cannabis dispensary. Their tenant, **One Green Leaf, LLC**, has been granted an annual class 5 cannabis license to operate.





### **Lucas Homestead**

DiMeglio Construction removed a portion of the shed from the side of the homestead. The shed was a modern addition to the property. The remaining shed will be repaired.



DiMeglio also removed the brick patio along the front of the home to enable a structural repair to be made. The bricks are onsite and will be reused to repair damaged bricks within the property.
